## **OUR GROWTH OVER** THE PAST **50 YEARS**

The St. Louis Area Foodbank has been making an impact in our community since 1975. Over the past 50 years, our operations have grown and evolved to meet the needs of the neighbors we serve. Here's a look at where we started vs where we are today.

- We DISTRIBUTED 135,000 pounds of food in 1975 vs 43 million pounds of food in 2024.
- We've EXPANDED from 14 pantry partners in 1975 to 588 partners today.
- Food DONATED by the community through food drives has grown from 17,000 pounds in 1975 vs 761,665 pounds in 2024.
- We've GROWN from operating in a small, donated office space in 1975 to the **94,000 sq-ft warehouse we use today**.

### PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: CHURCH OF GOD FOOD PANTRY

This year, the St. Louis Area Foodbank celebrates 50 years of nourishing our community, with the Church of God Food Pantry partnering with us for nearly four decades. What began in the mid-1990s as a monthly effort has grown to a weekly lifeline, serving up to 50 families.

"When we started, we were open once a month. Now we are doing it every week. The need has grown with high prices," says Bill Campbell, a dedicated volunteer since the pantry's inception. Run by a core team of three volunteers, including Bill who picks up orders from the Foodbank, their mission is clear: "We're a little church with a big mission. God has called us to feed people."

The impact of the Church of God Food Pantry extends far beyond filling empty stomachs. The volunteers have witnessed firsthand the difficult choices families face. "I have had people tell me they can't afford to buy medicine if it wasn't for us – can't afford food and other essentials," says Bill.

## ST. LOUIS AREA FOODBANK RISES TO THE OCCASION for Tornado-Impacted Neighbors

The St. Louis Area Foodbank has been actively engaged in the recovery efforts following the devastating tornado that swept through our community on May 16. In the wake of the destruction, the Foodbank has swiftly mobilized to provide essential support to neighbors impacted by the storm, demonstrating the unwavering spirit of generosity that defines our region.

On May 31, the Foodbank hosted a highly successful donation drive which was made possible through incredible partnerships with The Jayson Tatum Foundation, Chaminade College Preparatory School, First Alert 4, and KTRS. The outpouring of support from community members was truly inspiring, resulting in over 52,340 pounds of shelf-stable food, personal hygiene products, and household cleaning supplies being collected. These crucial provisions were immediately distributed to neighbors in need, offering a lifeline during challenging times.

As an integral part of both the state and city's disaster recovery efforts, the St. Louis Area Foodbank is committed to long-term support for affected residents. The Foodbank has been participating in special distribution events specifically for impacted neighbors to receive much-needed food, water, personal hygiene products, and household cleaning supplies. Furthermore, **the Foodbank has been actively supporting** 

**our dedicated pantry partners located in the tornadoimpacted areas,** ensuring they receive consistent deliveries of food and other items essential for recovery efforts.

The road to recovery is ongoing, and as such, additional donation drives and fundraising events are being planned. All proceeds and product donations from these initiatives will be directly channeled towards helping neighbors who reside in the areas hardest hit by the tornado.

For 50 years, the St. Louis Area Foodbank has proudly stood by our community through times of disaster and economic uncertainty. We are incredibly grateful to each and every individual, organization, and partner who has donated their time, funds, or items during this critical recovery effort. # DEDICATED VOLUNTEER, JEFF TANK FINDS PURPOSE AT THE ST. LOUIS AREA FOODBANK



For Jeff Tank, retirement in 2021 was a new beginning. **He and his wife, Nancy, started volunteering with the St. Louis Area Foodbank** in January 2022, turning a corporate volunteer day into a deeply rewarding commitment.

Jeff now volunteers at multiple shifts a week, including a weekly shift with Nancy, and for the past two and a half years, he's been a lead volunteer. "We love it," Jeff shares, emphasizing the unique fulfillment he finds in this work. He credits the "fantastic" staff and fellow volunteers for the positive experience.

One of the most impactful aspects of Jeff's volunteering has been participating in the Food on the Move (FOTM) program. While he understands the importance of the work done in the volunteer center, he expressed a desire to see where the food was going. Since his first FOTM event the week before Thanksgiving, he has consistently signed up for two locations a month, including sites in Madison, Illinois, and the Veterans Community Project.

Seeing neighbors directly receive the food he helped sort and package in the Volunteer Center has been incredibly rewarding for Jeff. He recalls packing carrots and then witnessing those same carrots being distributed at an FOTM event to individuals who needed them. He's been deeply moved by the appreciation shown by recipients, even those in difficult situations.

Jeff and Nancy's dedication to the St. Louis Area
Foodbank exemplifies the powerful impact of
volunteering. Their commitment not only supports the
Foodbank's mission but also enriches their own lives
through meaningful service and connection.







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
